Negro Leagues Beisbol Exhibit Rescheduled September 4 to October 30, 2021

The AAHM will present on September 4 to October 30, 2021 the *Traveling Exhibit: Negro Leagues Beisbol*, a production of the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum in Kansas City, MO, at the African American History Museum, 1440 Monument Avenue in Springfield.

The exhibit honors and explores the rich history and connections of African American baseball with Hispanic cultures, communities and countries beginning in the late 1800s.



The exhibit features profiles of significant baseball players, a timeline of American and Hispanic baseball history, and detailed baseball histories of several countries. The exhibit is bilingual, presented in both English and Spanish.

Unique stories of athletes with ties to the United States and Hispanic counties will be featured. They include Minnie Minoso, Willard Brown, Oscar

Dear Members and Friends,


It is rather amazing that considering the devastating effects of so many 2020 events in this country, the AAHM has had some remarkable highpoints.

It was after the **High School History Bowl** Finals held in March at the Museum that the realization of the **deadly Corona Virus** – **COVID-19** really hit home for most of us. On March 17, in line with the State of Illinois mitigations, the Museum closed its doors to the public. It re-opened on August 28, until raging Corona Virus cases in the state demanded another closing.

During the closing, the Illinois Dept of Public Health held COVID-19 testing at the Museum where they set up for people to come and get tested. From July 28 - September 22, the museum held Voter Registration Drives, conducted inside the museum by several sororities and fraternities, Black Lives Matter Springfield Chapter and the League of Women Voters.



The year 2020 was an unusual year, because we had to shutdown during the pandemic. Our financial support remained strong, particularly through the Virtual Gala, which raised \$29,035 toward Program Income. This level of support almost equaled prior years. And we certainly cut expenses, to almost half of recent years, when we shutdown.

The Museum's income in 2020 was almost \$16,000 more than expenses, therefore we enter 2021 with a positive balance in the Operations Account (\$40,948.42 on 1-31-2021) and a positive balance in the Grants Account (\$45,087.31 on 1-31-2021).

We expect to use these balances for a robust schedule of programs in 2021 and into the future, as we reopen safely and carefully. Thank you for your continued support – you enable us to maintain our important voice and expand our important work.

Thank you to all who contributed time and treasure to the Museum this year.

We are grateful for your membership and for contributions throughout the year.

Thank you all for seeing us through this challenging year.

AAHM 2020 webinars still available for Viewing

To continue to inform and bring the community authentic stories about African Americans, the AAHM hosted three webinars in 2020. These webinars were presented in cooperation with the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum (ALPLM).

- November 17 "Eva Monroe and the Colored Children's Home" based on Mary Francis' book about Monroe's courageous efforts to establish the home in Springfield, the first of its kind in the country.
- December 15 AAHM volunteer, Patricia James Davis portrayed Sojourner Truth.
- December 16 Robert Davis, AAHM volunteer, portrayed Frederick Douglass.

AAHM 2021 Webinars

- February 10 <u>Driving the Green Book</u> with authors Alvin Hall and Janee Woods-Weber. The book and discussion chronicles their trek across the country stopping at places highlighted in the Negro Motorist Guide, the Green Book.
- February 24 Dr. Thavolia Glymph discusses her book, <u>The Woman's Fight</u>, a comprehensive history of women's roles and lives in the Civil War- black/white, north/south, and slave/free. This webinar was sponsored jointly with ALPLM.
- March 18 "Valiant Women: Silent no more, through God, Faith, and Perseverance we rise." Several Central Illinois African American women authors tell stories of faith with the discussion of their book U.G.L.Y. (Uncovering Gods Love for You).
- March 20, 2 pm "African American Science Leaders Serving Central Illinois." This program is
 associated with The Big Read project and book selection, <u>Lab Girl</u>. The book is available at AAHM
